SHORT TITLE:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CHAIR AND BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE HALLANDALE BEACH COMMUNITY REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY, HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA; APPROVING THE INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH AND THE HALLANDALE BEACH COMMUNITY AGENCY RELATING TO THE PROVISION OF DIRECT SERVICES CONSISTING OF COMMUNITY POLICING INNOVATIONS BY THE CITY TO THE HBCRA FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023-2024 IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$1,485,809; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO EXECUTE THE INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO TAKE ALL STEPS NECESSARY AND APPROPRIATE TO IMPLEMENT THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF THE INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

STAFF SUMMARY:

Background:

State statute and good controllership require that the financial relationships between Cities and Community Redevelopment Agencies (CRAs) be codified in Interlocal Agreements (ILAs). The agreement clearly describes the services that the City will provide to the CRA and the compensation to be received for such services.

The FY 22/23 ILA between the Hallandale Beach Community Redevelopment Agency (HBCRA) and the Hallandale Beach Police Department was for \$1,716,971. This ILA included funding for SIU, departmental training to promote positive interactions between the community and police, and the addition to the City LPR/CCTV infrastructure, which has aided the police tremendously in their crime-fighting activities.

Current Situation:

For FY 23/24, the HBCRA proposes to enter into an ILA with the Police Department for the Police Strategic Intelligence Unit and Community Relations Specialist for \$1,485,809. These efforts are a continued part of the HBCRA's efforts at community policing innovations initiatives in accordance with Florida Statute 163 Part III as a way to reduce crime within the CRA, promote greater positive interactions between the community and the police, provide the community with the tools that they need to protect themselves and promote redevelopment and investment throughout the HBCRA.

This agreement has decreased by \$231,162 from last year's ILA as the installation of the LPRs and public safety camera projects has been completed. Over the past few months, the Police Department has worked very hard to provide

recommendations for greater community outreach, internal and external training for residents and police officers, and new crime-fighting tools. All of these changes have the singular goal of providing excellent overall service while equipping and enabling the police to obtain actionable criminal intelligence, thereby continuing the downward trend of reduced crime within the HBCRA.

Fiscal Impact:

The fiscal impact of the FY 23/24 ILA is \$1,485,809.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends the approval of FY 23/24 ILA between the COHB and HBCRA.

Why Action is Necessary

For the HBCRA to fund these services, the ILA's need to be approved by both the COHB and the HBCRA

PROPOSED ACTION:

The Executive Director recommends approval of the Interlocal Agreement.
