A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA, AUTHORIZING AWARD OF RFP # FY 2021-2022-014 DISASTER DEBRIS MONITORING SERVICES CONTRACT TO EISMAN AND RUSSO, INC.; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

STAFF SUMMARY:

Summary:

This item seeks City Commission approval to award RFP # FY 2021-2022-014 Disaster Debris Monitoring Services to the highest ranked vendor, Eisman & Russo, Inc., and to authorize the City Manager and City Attorney to negotiate and execute an agreement.

Background:

The City of Hallandale Beach is vulnerable to both man-made and natural disasters. Man-made disasters refer to instances of civil unrest and terrorist attacks, while natural disasters include events such as hurricanes, tornadoes, windstorms, floods and fires. The City must enter into a pre-need, pre-event contract with a qualified/experienced emergency and debris management firm responsible for removing, and lawfully disposing of disaster generated debris from public property and public maintained right-of ways during a disaster or emergency event.

On January 29, 2016 the City of Hallandale Beach advertised RFP #FY2015-2016-007. On August 17, 2016 the City Commission awarded BID #FY2015-2016-007, City of Hallandale Beach Disaster Debris Monitoring Services to Eisman and Russo, Inc.

On October 26, 2019 the initial term of the Disaster Debris Monitoring Services contract was scheduled to terminate. On Wednesday August 7, 2019 the City Commission extended the contract for three (3) additional one (1) year terms not to exceed a total contract term of six (6) years. The contract is set to expire on October 4, 2022.

In anticipation of the expiration of the final term of the mentioned contract, the City released RFP # FY 2021-2022-014 Disaster Debris Monitoring Services.

The release notice for the RFP was sent via email to over one thousand (1,000) vendors including from the City's Vendor list and pertinent vendors that have a City Business Tax License to operate in the City.
