SHORT TITLE:

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA, AUTHORIZING AWARD OF RFP # FY 2021-2022-013 DISASTER DEBRIS REMOVAL AND DISPOSAL SERVICES TO THE TWO HIGHEST RANKED VENDORS, DRC EMERGENCY SERVICES, LLC AS THE PRIMARY CONTRACTOR, AND CERES ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES, AS THE SECONDARY CONTRACTOR; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE ALL RELATED DOCUMENTS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

STAFF SUMMARY:

Summary:

This item seeks City Commission approval to award RFP # FY 2021-2022-013 Disaster Debris Removal and Disposal Services to the two highest ranked vendors, DRC Emergency Services, LLC as the Primary Contractor, and Ceres Environmental Services, as the Secondary Contractor and to authorize the City Manager and City Attorney to negotiate and execute agreements.

Background:

The City of Hallandale Beach is vulnerable to both man-made and natural disasters. Man-made disasters refer to instances of civil unrest and terrorist attacks, while natural disasters include events such as hurricanes, tornadoes, windstorms, floods, and fires. The City must enter into a pre-need, pre-event contract with a qualified/experienced emergency and debris management firm responsible for removing, and lawfully disposing of disaster generated debris from public property and public maintained right-of ways during a disaster or emergency event.

On January 29, 2016, the City of Hallandale Beach advertised RFP #FY2015-2016-006. On August 17, 2016, the City Commission awarded RFP #FY2015-2016-006, City of Hallandale Beach Disaster Debris Removal and Disposal Services, to Ashbritt Environmental as the Primary Contractor and Crowder Gulf as the Secondary Contractor.

On October 26, 2019, the initial term of the Disaster Debris Removal and Disposal Services contracts were scheduled to terminate. On Wednesday August 7, 2019, the City Commission extending the contract for three (3) additional one (1) year terms not to exceed a total contract term of six (6) years. The contracts terminate on October 4, 2022.

In anticipation of the expiration of the final term of the mentioned contracts, the City released RFP # FY 2021-2022-013 Disaster Debris Removal and Disposal Services
