THIS AMENDMENT TO DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT (the "Amendment") is made and entered into as of the day of ________, 2016 (the "Amendment Effective Date"), by and between DIPLOMAT GOLF COURSE VENTURE, LLC, a Florida limited liability company, whose mailing address is 501 Diplomat Parkway, Halladale Beach, Florida 33009 ("Developer"), and the CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH, a municipal corporation of the State of Florida, whose mailing address is 400 South Federal Highway, Hallandale Beach, Florida 33009 ("City").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Developer and the City entered into that certain Development Agreement for development of the Diplomat Golf and Tennis Club Project dated March 17, 2016 and recorded as Instrument No. 113592038 of the Public Records of Broward County, Florida (the "**Development Agreement**");

WHEREAS, the Development Agreement sets forth certain requirements related to the development of the real property described on Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "**Property**") as a mixed use project;

WHEREAS, the City Manager has approved this Amendment on behalf of the City in accordance with Sections 12 and 15 of the Development Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Developer and the City desire to incorporate the following minor modifications into the Development Agreement as further set forth in this Amendment.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements set forth in this Amendment and the Development Agreement, the adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, Developer and the City agree as follows:

1. <u>Incorporation of Whereas Clauses</u>. The Whereas clauses of this Amendment are true and correct and are incorporated into and made a part of this Amendment as specifically as if set forth herein. All capitalized terms used in this Amendment without separate definition shall have the same meanings assigned to them in the Development Agreement.

2. Community Benefit Plan.

- a. Developer and the City hereby acknowledge and agree that all employees hired by Developer from and after the Amendment Effective Date who are residents of Hallandale Beach at the time of hiring will be included in the calculation of all local workforce goals and requirements for the Community Benefit Plan set forth in Section 8.A.5. of the Development Agreement.
- b. Section 8.A.5 of the Development Agreement is hereby amended to provide that the deadline for formulation of the Permanent Workforce CBP for construction employment and Local Vendor Utilization during the Renovation Phase of the Project in accordance with the terms set forth therein is extended for an additional ninety (90) days to October 4, 2016.
- 3. <u>Lease for City Spaces</u>. Section 8.B.7.d. of the Development Agreement is hereby amended to provide that the deadline for Developer to provide forty-five (45) at grade parking spaces in accordance with the terms set forth therein is extended for an additional ninety (90) days to October 4, 2016.
 - 4. Sunrise Park Contribution. Developer acknowledges that:
 - a. the City of Hallandale Beach's City Commission determined that the contribution in the amount of \$50,000 (the "Contribution") paid by the Developer and accepted by the City in accordance with Section 11 of the Development Agreement for the DeSoto Waterway Shoreline improvement project will be expended by the City to improve Sunrise Park, and
 - b. the Developer has no objection to such use of the Contribution as determined by the City.
- 5. <u>Miscellaneous</u>. Except as specifically modified in this Amendment, all of the terms and conditions of the Development Agreement are and shall remain in full force and effect. In the event of any inconsistency between the terms of this Amendment and the terms of the Development Agreement, the terms of this Amendment shall control. This Amendment shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida; and this Amendment shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs, legal representatives, successors and permitted assigns of Developer and the City.

History of the Foundation

The Broward Education Foundation

n the fall of 1983, a few community activists had been working on a program called the "Total Child" to support the Broward County public schools. In response to the hard work and success of these dedicated women and in alignment with the District's Comprehensive Plan for Education, Dr. William McFatter, Superintendent of Schools recommended to the school board that this group operate as the Board's affiliated Foundation. His motion was approved on November 21, 1983 and the Foundation was officially chartered in August 1984.

In addition to Dr. McFatter, among some of the other individuals credited with launching the organization were Mrs. Selma Hopen of the BCMA Auxiliary; Dr. Linda Murray, an associate superintendent; Dr. Dorothy Orr, a prominent educator and advocate; Mrs. Bertha Smolian, who provided the seed money and first donation of \$5,000. Dr. William C. Drainer, former Broward County Schools Superintendent, served as the Foundation's first chairman of the board of directors.

By 1985, the Foundation was able to award 20 mini-grants to teachers for classroom projects. In 1989, a fulltime executive director was appointed, Ruthe Lowy, and the first fundraiser for scholarships was held. The BRACE (Broward Advisors for Continuing Education) scholarship program was established to provide scholarships to qualifying students who had exhausted all avenues for financial aid and still fell short of the funds needed to

pursue postsecondary education. In the ensuing years, the Teacher Mini-Grant Program was expanded to include the Citibank Success Fund and IMPACT II, a national program designed to recognize and reward innovative teachers.

In April 1990, the name of the Foundation was changed to Broward Education Foundation, Inc., and in May of that same year, the Foundation became a Direct Support Organization of the School Board. Today raising close to \$200,000.

As the Foundation entered the 21st Century, support for student success Pre-K – 12 emerged as the premiere program of support for the Foundation. In 2015, more than \$250,000 was distributed in grant awards to innovative teachers to support emerging quality educational programs.

For the next ten years, the Broward Education Foundation continued to grow and expand raising funds, hosting award ceremonies and galas, recognizing Broward County student alumni for their community efforts, and implementing important programming for students in need, especially those in low-income areas. The Foundation Gala, began as part of an effort to raise scholarship funds. The Gala has evolved to become a fundraising and community engagement event, celebrating the accomplishments of the Foundation's programs and initiatives. It is also an opportunity to honor outstanding philanthropists and partners in our mission.

Supporting Success for Broward County Public School Students since 1983

In 2001, the Foundation initiated a program for students in need, specifically those lacking basic school supplies. Tools for Schools Broward began as a storefront with a location at Fort Lauderdale High School. Teachers from throughout the County traveled to "shop" for free school supplies to equip their students with the necessary tools for learning. Tools for Schools Broward located in Pompano Beach, Florida, occupies approximately 7,087 square feet (3,076 square of feet shopping area and 4,011 square feet of warehouse). By 2015, annual distribution of school supplies to teachers from schools with large numbers of students from economically challenged families received more than \$1M in donated school supplies.

Today, the Broward Education Foundation is governed by a thirty member Board of Directors, with eleven working committees and an annual operating budget of \$2.2M. The Foundation's essential programs for support are Innovative Teaching, Tools for Schools Broward and the Student Scholarship Program. In addition, the Foundation serves as a fiduciary agent

for more than 200 funds set up by individuals and groups whose mission is in harmony with ours. The Foundation continues to serve as a catalyst for educational excellence and support for the amazing work in the Broward County Public Schools.

ach year Broward Education Foundation Scholarship Program raises dollars to provide scholarships to deserving graduating seniors who dream of attending college.

Through the Broward Education Scholarship Program, qualifying Broward County students receive scholarships to attend a state or community college, university or technical college.

Since the creation of the Broward Education Student Scholarship Fund, the Broward Education Foundation has provided over 5,000 scholarships to graduating high school seniors, totaling over \$11M.

2015/2016 Scholarship Program

- Over 1,500 students across Broward County public schools applied online to be considered for a Broward Education Foundation Student Scholarship.







SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM MEMO OF UNDERSTANDING

June 8, 2018

This is an agreement between City of Hallandale Beach and The Broward Education Foundation.

The City of Hallandale Beach has pledged \$15,000 per year for 8 consecutive years in order to create scholarship opportunities to support Broward County Public School City of Hallandale graduates to be awarded in Fall of each year.

Requirements to be considered and maintain award:

- Resident of the City of Hallandale Beach, Florida in Broward County.
- Must be graduating from a Broward County public High school. High Schools within the City are preferred but not mandatory.
- Minimum of 2.5 high school GPA.
- Required Essay: What are your goals and aspirations and how will a scholarship through the City of Hallandale Beach help you reach your goals?
- A minimum of 40 community service hours by application deadline.
- Minimum of 2.25 Post-Secondary GPA.
- Full time Fall and Spring and or 24 Credit Hours per year.

Additional criteria will be evaluated and weighted in the selection process but not restrict students that meet the above criteria.

- FAFSA report and College Financial Aid Award Letter and work study or employment intention during high school.
- Internship, High School and/or work experience within the City of Hallandale Beach.
- The selected recipients will be invited to a City Commission Meeting to be recognized.

The City will:

- Provide payment of \$15,000 each year for 8 consecutive years due on July 15 each year to have opportunity posted.
 - If additional scholarship gifts are considered, a supplemental/adjusted invoice will be provided.
 - o Funding for the City's gift is through a separate Development contract with the Diplomat Golf Course signed on July 19, 2016. The City guarantees to hold current funds in the amount of \$30,000 in escrow until invoiced. If the Diplomat cancels the remainder of their contract or is not able to fund this commitment by July 15 each year, the City and/or the Foundation is able to cancel the remaining commitment with no additional negative impact on either part.
- Invite recipients to a Commission Meeting to be recognized.
- Provide RSVPs and Ad submissions for Foundation Scholarship Awards Ceremony and Programs each year.

The Broward Education Foundation will:

 Present Memo of Understanding with pledge information and invoice current amount of \$15,000. Provide the City with an end of year update report by July 1 of each subsequent year.

- Provide City of Hallandale opportunity to online application, website, Naviance and distribute to BRACE Advisors for distribution.
- Provide application details to the Selection Committee who will short-list the applicants to the qualified applicants for this opportunity.
- Selection Committee will establish the most qualified students and their need. The Foundation
 will recommend the # of students (2 5), the amount of each award and the maintenance fee,
 not to exceed \$15,000 each year. The Selection Committee will select the applicants most
 qualified with the requirements as described.
- Provide award, ceremony and Commission meeting notifications to students that are selected.
- Provide partial payments of Scholarship designated amounts to students that are selected as
 recipients and provide all required contract documentation and proof of attendance with
 submitted fall schedule. Provide final installment payments of designated amounts after all
 required contract documentation and proof of attendance is submitted for the spring semester.
- Consider and recommend to City award discipline if student is out of contract compliance. City to approve recommendation or offer comments regarding discipline course of action. I.e (Approve, Suspend or Revoke)
