1 EXHIBIT 1 2 RESOLUTION NO. 2019. 3 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA URGING STATE ACTION TO ADDRESS THE PROLIFERATION AND ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT OF SINGLE-USE PLASTIC BAGS; URGING THE LEGISLATIVE ADOPTION OF THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION FEBRUARY 1, 2010, STUDY RECOMMENDING STATE ACTION REGARDING SINGLE-USE PLASTIC BAGS; OPPOSING CONTINUED PREEMPTION OF LOCAL LEGISLATIVE EFFORTS TO ADDRESS THE PROLIFERATION OF SINGLE-USE PLASTIC BAGS; OPPOSING CONTINUED PREEMPTION OF LOCAL LEGISLATIVE EFFORTS TO ADDRESS THE REPUSING TO TAKE ACTION; AND SUPPORTING INITIATIVES BY LOCAL MUNICIPALITIES IN FLORIDA TO LESSEN THE NEGATIVE IMPACT OF SINGLE-USE PLASTIC BAGS ON OUR ENVIRONMENT; DIRECTING THE CITY CLERK TO TRANSMIT A COPY OF THIS RESOLUTION; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. 17 WHEREAS, the City of Hallandale Beach, a coastal community, is diligent in its efforts to preserve the beautiful environment, including our ocean, waterways, Everglades and land in between, which is so vital to our regional economy and the State of Florida; and 18 WHEREAS, the well understood that plastic bags are detrimental to our environment because they do not fully degrade in our oceans or land environment and introduce unsale chemicals into our environment; and 19 WHEREAS, the expansive usage of single-use shopping bags and their low disposal and recycling rates creates an impediment to the City's waste reduction and recycling goals which are the product of the partial degradation of the plastic bags; and 19 WHEREAS, single-use plastic bags are difficult to				
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33 **WHEREAS**, the City applauds those businesses and residents who have taken 34 affirmative and proactive steps towards the goal of reducing single-use plastic bags in the 35 distribution chain and environment; and

WHEREAS, the Florida Legislature passed a law in 2008 which stated "[t]he Legislature finds that prudent regulation of recyclable materials is crucial to the ongoing welfare of Florida's ecology and economy." (Fla. Stat. Section 403.7033); and

39 WHEREAS, the Florida Legislature, through the enactment of Florida Statutes Section 403.7033, directed "the Department of Environmental Protection shall undertake an analysis of 40 41 the need for new or different regulation of auxiliary containers, wrappings, or disposable plastic bags used by consumers to carry products from retail establishments. The analysis shall include 42 43 input from state and local government agencies, stakeholders, private businesses, and citizens, 44 and shall evaluate the efficacy and necessity of both statewide and local regulation of these 45 materials. To ensure consistent and effective implementation, the department shall submit a 46 report with conclusions and recommendations to the Legislature no later than February 1, 2010."; and 47

48 WHEREAS, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection ("FDEP") issued and 49 transmitted a report on February 1, 2010, titled *Retail Bags Report to Legislature*, which outlined 50 "how improperly discarded plastic bags can affect wildlife, marine life, landfill operation and 51 flood control systems and explores the various approaches that other states and countries have 52 taken to address this issue. Included in the report is a wide-ranging set of options for decreasing 53 the number of bags being used as well as increasing the number of bags being recycled" 54 (https://floridadep.gov/waste/waste-reduction/content/retail-bags-report); and

55 **WHEREAS**, the FDEP's 2010 report concluded "there are ways to reduce our 56 dependency on these bags and to properly reuse or dispose of them" and recommended "that 57 the Legislature review the available options and take action to discourage the use of single-use 58 paper and plastic retail bags and encourage the use of reusable retail bags." 59 (https://floridadep.gov/waste/waste-reduction/content/retail-bags-report); and

60 **WHEREAS**, Florida Statute Section 403.7033, however, commands that "[u]ntil such 61 time that the Legislature adopts the recommendations of the department, no local government, 62 local governmental agency, or state government agency may enact any rule, regulation, or

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ordinance regarding use, disposition, sale, prohibition, restriction, or tax of such auxiliary
 containers, wrappings, or disposable plastic bags."; and

65 **WHEREAS**, since the 2010 FDEP report the Florida Legislature has taken no action as 66 recommended by FDEP and has not adopted the FDEP study; and

67 **WHEREAS**, in 2019, a proposed bill to repeal the preemption on any local efforts to 68 pass any regulation or ordinance on single-use plastic bags failed to pass a single committee of 69 the Florida Legislature (<u>https://www.flsenate.gov/Session/Bill/2019/00088</u>); and

WHEREAS, a Circuit Court in and for the 11th Judicial Circuit has found that the
 preemption in Florida Statutes Section 403.7033 is unconstitutional and upheld the City of Coral
 Gables' regulation of single-use plastic bags (<u>https://resource-recycling.com/plastics/wp-</u>
 <u>content/uploads/sites/4/2017/05/Feb.27-CoralGables-decision.pdf</u>); and

WHEREAS, according to publicly available sources, three states have passed
 regulations intended to reduce single-use plastic and paper bags (Hawaii, California and New
 York); and

WHEREAS, it is reported that at least 345 municipalities in 25 states have adopted bans
 and/or fees on single-use plastic and paper bags
 (<u>http://publicfiles.surfrider.org/Plastics/Plastic_Bag_Law_Activist_Toolkit_2019.pdf</u>); and

80 **WHEREAS**, it was reported that 32 countries have in place some sort of regulation 81 intended to reduce the proliferation of single-use plastic bags, through outright ban or otherwise 82 (https://www.reusethisbag.com/articles/where-are-plastic-bags-banned-around-the-world); and

83 **WHEREAS**, Florida Governor Ron DeSantis recently stated, in his veto of legislation 84 which would prohibit local jurisdictions from banning single-use plastic straws:

- a. "These measures have not, as far as I can tell, frustrated any state policy or
 harmed the state's interests. In fact, the Florida Department of Environmental
 Protection has encouraged Florida residents, schools and businesses to reduce
 plastic straw use."; and
- b. In a brief but very powerful reminder of the fundamental philosophical
 foundations of local democracy, the Governor concluded: "Under these
 circumstances, the State should simply allow local communities to address this

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- 92 issue through the political process. Citizens who oppose plastic straw
 93 ordinances can seek recourse by electing people who share their views."
 94 (<u>https://www.flgov.com/wp-content/uploads/2019/05/05.103.pdf</u>); and
- WHEREAS, if the State does not act to regulate the proliferation of single-use shopping
 bags and take comprehensive and meaningful actions to reduce the negative impact on our
 environment, municipalities and counties should be permitted to work together to enact
 regulations governing the proliferation of single-use plastic checkout bags; and
- 99 WHEREAS, the City believes all residents and businesses can work cooperatively and 100 play a meaningful role to reduce the proliferation of single-use plastic bags by reducing the 101 reliance on single-use plastic bags through the use of reusable shopping bags and can reduce 102 the negative impact of single-use plastic bags on our environment by properly disposing the 103 bags.

104 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSION 105 OF THE CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA:

107 <u>Section 1</u>. The foregoing "WHEREAS" clauses are hereby ratified and confirmed as 108 being true and correct and are incorporated herein by this reference.

109 <u>Section 2</u>. The City Commission of the City of Hallandale Beach, Florida is 110 committed to the long-term goal of reducing the harms of plastic pollution on our fragile 111 environment and committed to ensuring a thriving, attractive and safe environment for current 112 and future residents and tourists.

113 <u>Section 3</u>. The City Commission urges the Florida Legislature and Governor to take 114 comprehensive and meaningful action to reduce and mitigate the proliferation of single-use 115 plastic bags and the negative impact on our environment.

Section 4. The City Commission urges the Florida Legislature to adopt the findings of the February 1, 2010 Florida Department of Environmental Protection titled *Retail Bags Report to Legislature*.

- <u>Section 5</u>. If the Florida Legislature will not take action on the proliferation of single-use
 plastic bags, the City Commission opposes continued preemption of local efforts to address
 both use and disposal of single-use plastic bags.
- 122 <u>Section 6</u>. The City Commission supports initiatives by local municipalities to lessen the 123 negative impact of single-use plastic bags on our environment, including promotion of reusable 124 shopping bags as the best alternative to single-use plastic bags.

125 <u>Section 7</u>. The City Commission further directs the City Clerk to transmit a copy of 126 this Resolution to all appropriate parties.

127 <u>Section 8</u>. All Resolutions or parts of Resolutions in conflict herewith, be and the 128 same are repealed to the extent of such conflict.

129 <u>Section 9</u>. If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Resolution is held to be 130 invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, then said holding shall in no 131 way affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution.

132 <u>Section 10. Effective Date</u>. This Resolution shall be effective immediately upon its
 133 passage.
