## HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA 1 **RESOLUTION NO. 20-**2 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA, 3 URGING THE FLORIDA LEGISLATURE TO APPROVE MEDICAID 4 EXPANSION FOR THOSE QUALIFIED IN AN EFFORT TO ADDRESS 5 COVID-19 PUBLIC HEALTH AND 6 UNEMPLOYMENT EMERGENCY; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR 7 8 SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. WHEREAS, the city of Hallandale Beach prides itself on the well-being and 9 health of all its residents; and 10 WHEREAS, a remarkable and unconscionable 15.3% or 297,833 residents of 11 Broward County are estimated to be uninsured for healthcare by the 2019 Census 12 American Community Survey data<sup>1</sup>; and 13 14 WHEREAS, due to the COVID-19 pandemic healthcare coverage is a need especially for Floridians who have lost their employer sponsored healthcare due to 15 rising unemployment as was seen in the Great Recession of 2008-09; and 16 WHEREAS, Medicaid is a public health insurance program for low income 17 people that was started in 1965 and in Florida nearly 4 million people have their 18 healthcare covered through Medicaid who are mostly children, pregnant women, 19 20 parents, seniors over the age of 65, people with disabilities; and 21 WHEREAS, the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act provides for the federal funding for states to expand Medicaid to all citizens earning less than 138% of 22 the federal poverty level; and 23 WHEREAS, this Medicaid expansion would extend insurance coverage to more 24 than 800,000 Floridians<sup>2</sup>; and 25 WHEREAS, according to the Florida Policy Institute, Florida would see net state 26 budget savings of roughly \$200 million in Fiscal Year 2022-23 by expanding the 27 Medicaid program<sup>3</sup>; and 28

WHEREAS, our state legislature's decision to not expand Medicaid means that some of our most vulnerable citizens – especially adults without children with incomes below 100% of the federal poverty level – will go without coverage in 2020 because they are not eligible for subsidies on the healthcare exchange or marketplace; and

WHEREAS, this is an unconscionable rejection of public funds that puts our most vulnerable and needy residents at-risk needlessly; and

WHEREAS, 39 states (including D.C.) have adopted Medicaid expansion; and

**WHEREAS**, considering the COVID-19 state of emergency and for public health purposes, it is necessary that Floridians who are most in need have access to health insurance; and

WHEREAS, the benefits of expanded Medicaid eligibility would not only serve those who would obtain healthcare coverage, but the general public as well because the number of uninsured people would decrease and the number of people who receive healthcare treatment would likely result in a corresponding increase which, among other things, diminishes the likelihood of transmitting a communicable disease like the highly contagious COVID-19; and

**WHEREAS,** Floridians who are losing their jobs, savings, and economic standing should not have to suffer because of arbitrary denials by our legislature and state leadership; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Commission of Hallandale Beach believes all residents should have access to quality healthcare.

## NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA:

- **Section 1.** The foregoing "WHEREAS" clauses are hereby ratified and confirmed as being true and correct and are incorporated herein by this reference.
- **Section 2.** The City Commission of the City of Hallandale Beach, Florida strongly urges the Florida Legislature and the Governor to accept federal funds to expand Medicaid in Florida.
- **Section 3.** Medicaid expansion would benefit communities of color, parents and children, women, working class, people with mental illness and substance use disorders,
