SHORT TITLE:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CHAIR AND BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE HALLANDALE BEACH COMMUNITY REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY, HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA; APPROVING THE INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH AND THE HALLANDALE BEACH COMMUNITY AGENCY RELATING TO THE PROVISION OF DIRECT SERVICES CONSISTING OF COMMUNITY POLICING INNOVATIONS BY THE CITY TO THE HBCRA FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024-2025 IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$1,826,237; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO EXECUTE THE INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO TAKE ALL STEPS NECESSARY AND APPROPRIATE TO IMPLEMENT THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF THE INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

STAFF SUMMARY:

Background:

State statutes (Section 163.01 and 163.400, Florida Statutes) and good controllership require that the financial relationships between Cities and Community Redevelopment Agencies (CRAs) be codified in Interlocal Agreements (ILAs). The ILA clearly describes the services that the City will provide to the HBCRA and the compensation to be received for such services.

The FY 23/24 ILA between the Hallandale Beach Community Redevelopment Agency (HBCRA) and the City of Hallandale Beach (COHB) for community policing innovations to be provided by the Hallandale Beach Police Department was for \$1,485,809. This ILA included funding for the Strategic Intelligence Unit (SIU), the Community Relations Specialist (CRS), and the Quadrant Safety Board (QSB) promoting positive interactions between the community and police, which has aided the police tremendously in their crime-fighting activities and the quadrant safety board.

Current Situation:

For FY 24/25, the HBCRA proposes to enter into an ILA with the COHB for community policing innovations to fund the Police SIU, CRS, additional License plate reader cameras (LPRs) and public safety cameras (CCTV) and the Quadrant Safety Board for \$1,826,237. These efforts are a continued part of the HBCRA's efforts at community policing innovations initiatives in accordance with Part III of Chapter 163, Florida Statutes, as a way to reduce crime within the Community Redevelopment Area (CRA) by, among other things, reducing opportunities for, and increasing the perceived risks of engaging in, criminal activity through visible presence of police in the CRA, promote greater positive interactions between the community and the police, provide the community with the tools that they need to protect themselves and promote redevelopment and investment throughout the HBCRA.

This ILA has increased by \$340,428 from last year's ILA due to the expansion of LPRs and the CCTVs projects. Over the past few months, the Police Department has worked diligently to provide recommendations for greater community outreach, internal and external training for residents and police officers, and new crime-fighting tools. All of these changes have the singular goal of providing excellent overall service while equipping and enabling the police to obtain actionable criminal intelligence, thereby continuing the downward trend of reduced crime within the CRA through the implementation of community policing innovations.

Fiscal Impact:

The fiscal impact of the FY 24/25 ILA is \$1,826,237.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends the approval of FY 24/25 ILA between the COHB and HBCRA.

Why Action is Necessary

For the HBCRA to fund these services, the ILA's need to be approved by both the COHB and the HBCRA

PROPOSED ACTION:

The Executive Director recommends approval of the Interlocal Agreement.
