SHORT TITLE:

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA AUTHORIZING ENTERING INTO AN INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT WITH BROWARD COUNTY TO PROVIDE SERVICES NECESSARY FOR COMPLIANCE WITH THE NATIONAL POLLUTANT DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM MUNICIPAL SEPARATE STORM SEWER SYSTEM (MS4) PERMIT FOR A PERIOD OF FIVE (5) YEARS AT A TOTAL CUMULATIVE COST NOT-TO-EXCEED SIXTY-THREE THOUSAND, ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY FOUR DOLLARS (\$63,134); AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

STAFF SUMMARY:

Summary:

Staff seeks City Commission approval of an Interlocal Agreement (ILA) with Broward County to provide services necessary for compliance with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permit. The term of this Agreement shall begin on the date it is recorded pursuant to Section 11.25 ("Effective Date") and shall continue in force and effect for five (5) years,

unless terminated earlier by a Party's written notice of termination provided for in the agreement. City Commission approval to include authorization of five (5) annual expenditures at a cumulative cost not-to-exceed amount of \$63,134.

Background:

The NPDES program, administered by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) under federal Clean Water Act requirements, regulates stormwater discharges from municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4s). Broward County and its municipalities have historically operated under a coordinated, countywide approach through interlocal agreements to ensure consistent compliance with permit requirements, including water quality monitoring, public education, illicit discharge detection, and annual reporting.

The City has previously participated in such agreements to efficiently meet regulatory obligations while benefiting from shared resources and technical expertise provided by the County.

Broward County, under this agreement, will continue to be the lead entity for regional coordination, monitoring, reporting, and regulatory compliance support on behalf of participating municipalities, including the City of Hallandale Beach.

Current Situation:

A new NPDES MS4 permit cycle has been issued (or is anticipated to be issued) by FDEP, introducing updated regulatory requirements, enhanced reporting standards, and expanded programmatic responsibilities. To maintain compliance under the new permit, participating municipalities must enter an updated Interlocal Agreement with Broward County.

Execution of this agreement will allow the City to continue participating in the countywide program, ensuring that all required monitoring, documentation, and reporting elements are completed in accordance with the new permit conditions.

Approval of the Interlocal Agreement is necessary to ensure the City remains in compliance with state and federal stormwater regulations under the NPDES program. Failure to execute the agreement could result in the City being independently responsible for all permit requirements, significantly increasing administrative burden, operational complexity, and potential exposure to regulatory violations, fines, and enforcement actions. Participation in the countywide program ensures regulatory compliance is achieved in a coordinated, efficient, and consistent manner.

Why Action is Necessary:

Pursuant to Code of Ordinances, in accordance with Procurement Code Section 23-9, Award, (e) The City Manager may award procurements within the delegated spending authority. All other procurements, except emergency procurements, require commission approval for award.

Cost Benefit:

Funding for this agreement is provided through the City's Stormwater Management Program. Participation in the Broward County NPDES program provides a cost-effective approach by leveraging shared services, regional expertise, and economies of scale.

By partnering with the County, the City avoids the higher costs associated with independently implementing complex regulatory requirements, including water quality monitoring, data analysis, and permit reporting. Additionally, the coordinated approach reduces duplication of efforts, improves program efficiency, and enhances overall compliance with environmental regulations, thereby minimizing the risk of costly penalties.
