SHORT TITLE:

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HALLANDALE BEACH, FLORIDA, APPROVING THE DR-4673-HURRICANE IAN SUBRECIPIENT AGREEMENT AWARDED THROUGH THE DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY TO RESPOND TO AND RECOVER FROM HURRICANE IAN AND FOR LIMITED MITIGATION MEASURES; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

STAFF SUMMARY:

Summary:

Staff seeks City Commission approval and acceptance of the federally funded DR-4673-Hurricane Ian Subrecipient Agreement awarded through the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to respond to and recover from Hurricane Ian, a major disaster/emergency and for limited mitigation measures.

Background:

On September 24, 2022, President Joseph R. Biden, Jr. declared an emergency in the State of Florida and ordered Federal assistance to supplement state, tribal, and local response efforts due to the emergency conditions resulting from Hurricane Ian beginning on September 23, 2022, and continuing.

The President's action authorizes the Department of Homeland Security, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), to coordinate all disaster relief efforts which have the purpose of alleviating the hardship and suffering caused by the emergency on the local population, and to provide appropriate assistance for required emergency measures, authorized under Title V of the Stafford Act, to save lives and to protect property and public health and safety, and to lessen or avert the threat of a catastrophe in the counties of Brevard, Broward, Charlotte, Collier, Desoto, Glades, Hardee, Hendry, Highlands, Hillsborough, Indian River, Lee, Manatee, Martin, Miami-Dade, Monroe, Okeechobee, Osceola, Palm Beach, Pasco, Pinellas, Polk, Sarasota, and St. Lucie and the Miccosukee Tribe of Indians of Florida and the Seminole Tribe of Florida.

Disaster relief efforts include funding from the FEMA Public Assistance (PA) program. This program provides financial assistance for disaster response and recovery efforts to state and local governments. A standard funding split of 75% federal and 25% state or local government responsibility would apply to the City. In accordance with Florida Statutes, there may be matching requirements between the State and the City through a cost-sharing arrangement. The cost-sharing arrangement aims to distribute the financial burden of emergency protective measures and disaster recovery between the federal government, the State, and the City, and is included in the subaward and grant agreement pertaining to each disaster.

Current Situation:

The City is in receipt of a subaward and grant agreement that needs to be accepted by the City Commission to then be executed. The amount of total available funding for this subgrant is limited to the amount obligated by the Federal Awarding Agency for emergency protective measures (also known as "Category B" activities). Payments to Subrecipients are contingent upon the granting of budget authority to the State of Florida, Division of Emergency Management.

Why Action is Necessary:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 5.01, of the City of Hallandale Beach Charter, Resolutions are to be presented to and adopted by the Commission. Furthermore, the City's Grants Administrative

Policy requires a resolution of the City Commission to authorize the approval and acceptance of the grant application and/or awards over \$50,000

Cost Benefit:

As a result of the weather disturbance that was designated as Hurricane Ian, the City Manager authorized to do all things reasonable and necessary to effectuate the emergency procedures and to take action as authorized in the City's Code of Ordinance and Florida Statue 252. Departments in the City performed emergency protective measures including but not limited to placing barricades, emergency pumping, keeping pedestrians away from the beach, flood fighting, and security. These actions resulted in an increase of labor of approximately 918 overtime hours. The acceptance of this grant award provides for up to 100% of the funds needed to reimburse the overtime hours incurred and amounts to approximately \$63,000.
